



Unseasonably warm temperatures in May combined with a drier than normal snow season will mean significantly low streams in many areas.

### **Drought** intensifies

NOAA's Climate Prediction Center is calling for a warmer and drier than normal summer and the Drought Monitor recently added a severe drought designation for parts of central and southeastern Oregon.

Governor Kate Brown has officially declared a drought state of emergency in Grant, Harney, Lake, and Klamath Counties. Water users are advised to plan for water shortages in these regions, especially those without access to reservoir storage.

Snowpack in the Okangan has decreased dramatically since mid-May, as officials predict increased risks of a drought.

Snowpack in the Okanagan was at 51 per cent of normal on June 1, according to the River Forecast Centre's latest report released Thursday.

This is down from 126 per cent of normal on May 15 and 206 per cent of normal on May 1.

Last year on June 1, the snowpack in the Okanagan was at 228 per cent of normal.

Environment Canada is predicting a warmer and drier than normal summer, increasing the risks for low flows and drought, the River Forecast Centre stated in its report.



NIFC's forecast said parts of California, Washington and Oregon received less than half the normal precipitation in May, jump-starting the fuel-drying process. A dry spring may offset Washington's near-normal snowpack, allowing mountain fuels to become critically dry by July, the forecast said. Later in July, Northern Rockies fuels that grew strongly during the region's wet spring and follow a snowy winter should be dried out at lower and middle elevations.

The healthy fine-fuel crop elevates fire potential through August and early September across many lower and middle elevations from the central Great Basin and California north to Canada, NIFC said.



Higher mountain elevations also may see greater fire potential should warmer and drier than average conditions develop as expected.

Drier-than-average conditions are expected to develop across much of the West starting this month and lasting through September, the NIFC forecast said.

California firefighters no longer gear up for the "fire season." They gear up to fight fires year-round and they want the public to get into that mindset as well.

The insurance industry numbers show California has become the leading state for wildfires with 9,560 in 2017 that consumed 1.3 million acres. Georgia had the second-highest number of fires but lagged far behind with just 3,929, and Idaho had the second-highest number of acres burned but again, lagged far behind with 686,262 acres burned.

In California, the costs in 2017 were severe: 44 people dead and more than \$10 billion in damage.

Mike Mohler, deputy director of communications for Cal Fire, says there's particular concern for people living in urban areas who think they're not at risk. He cites last year's Santa Rosa fire as an example. "Walmart burned in the middle of the city. It jumped a six-lane freeway. It burned down Starbucks. Those are the kind of conditions that we're seeing," he told CBN News.

### **Climate Change Once Again**



Satellite data and images are provocative, even disturbing. They confront us with a global view that can be at once breathtaking, like a piece of art, and yet, in this era of rapidly changing climate, they paint a picture of the demise of the environment. How and if we will respond to what we see is uncertain. That uncertainty lies at the root of our perilous future.

The water future the map portends is daunting.

In California's Central Valley, parts of which are dark red on our map, mid-latitude drying, persistent drought and falling water tables are already driving the cost of drilling deeper wells far beyond what any average family can afford. And declining groundwater quality and subsiding land are signals that the aquifers are being pushed past their tipping point, losing more water than can be replenished in a year.

Hydrologist Jay Famiglietti is a professor and incoming director of the Global Institute for Water Security at the University of Saskatchewan in Canada. He is senior author of the article "Emerging Trends in Global Freshwater Availability," published in Nature in May.

Water district delays tentative deal with Poseidon for desalination plant

Acknowledging opponents' concerns, the Orange County Water District board on Wednesday night postponed a vote on updated terms for buying water from the <u>desalination plant proposed for Huntington Beach</u> by Poseidon Resources.

The non-binding term sheet, which will be considered again July 18, would revise the groundwork for an eventual contract if Poseidon gets the final <u>two regulatory permits needed</u> for construction and the district decides to proceed.

Some 18 residents, environmental activists and representatives from other water districts leveled criticism at the project, questioning the need, the cost and the track record of Poseidon's 2 1/2-year-old desalter plant in Carlsbad. Numerous opponents also complained that they'd had insufficient time to study the revised term sheet, which was released to the public on Friday.

Several of the 10 water board members also raised questions and while others on the panel said they were ready to support the updated document, the vote was unanimous to hold off on a decision.

"I think it would improve the public's trust and I see little harm in delaying this," said board member Bruce Whitaker, who also sits on the Fullerton City Council.

The board's willingness to slow down the process — which has already been on the drawing board for nearly two decades — caught some off guard, as many expected swift approval.

"I'm stunned," said Ray Hiemstra, associate director for Orange County Coastkeeper, a leading opponent of the project. "What this means is there's enough doubt, they don't want to ram it through."

However, Poseidon Vice President Scott Maloni appeared to take latest delay in stride.

"It's an appropriate action," he said. "It gives people more opportunity to comment."

### Now the Lawyers Will Have Their Day

12 Northern California wildfires sparked by PG&E power lines, investigators say By <u>Kurtis Alexander</u>

At least <u>a dozen wildfires</u> that ripped through Northern California last October, including the deadly Atlas and Nuns fires in the North Bay, were caused by Pacific Gas and Electric Co. power lines, state officials said Friday.

The findings by the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection are the first to lay out an official source of ignition for any of the Wine Country blazes, which killed 41 people and destroyed nearly 9,000 homes in a wind-driven inferno. The most destructive of the burns, the Tubbs Fire that hit Santa Rosa, remains under investigation.

The completed investigations show that downed electric lines or trees and branches coming into contact with power equipment sparked eight fires in Sonoma and Napa counties, which resulted in eight fatalities, as well as Mendocino County's Redwood Fire, which left nine dead. Three smaller blazes, in Lake, Humboldt and Butte counties, were also ignited by PG&E equipment, according to Cal Fire.

In eight of the 12 fires, Cal Fire officials said PG&E violated state law, though investigators did not cite what specific laws were broken.

Friday's announcement has major ramifications for the utility, which has warned of an unprecedented financial hit as victims take to the courts.

PG&E released a statement Friday saying the company was saddened by the losses from the wildfires, but distanced itself from responsibility.

"Based on the information we have so far, we continue to believe our overall programs met our state's high standards," the company said.

Cal Fire officials are forwarding the completed investigations of the eight fires in which PG&E is alleged to have violated state law to district attorneys in the counties that burned. These fires are the Atlas, Norrbom, Partrick, Pythian, Adobe and Pocket fires in Sonoma and Napa counties as well as the Sulphur Fire in Lake County and Blue Fire in Humboldt County.

District attorneys have the authority to pursue criminal charges or civil suits. The Sonoma County district attorney's office confirmed Friday that it had been in touch with Cal Fire about the investigations, as had district attorneys in Napa and Lake counties and state Attorney General Xavier Becerra.

Bill Brockley, Sonoma County assistant district attorney, said his office was reviewing Cal Fire's findings before deciding how to move forward.

The California Public Utilities Commission, which regulates state power companies, also can issue fines.

October's unprecedented blazes burned more than 245,000 acres across Northern California. Some 170 separate ignitions were counted, according to Cal Fire.

### Controversial California WaterFix bill on the table

A federal spending bill containing a provision that could spell disaster for opponents of the California WaterFix project passed an important hurdle when it was approved by the House Committee on Appropriations last week.

The Fiscal Year 2019 Interior and Environment Appropriations bill, introduced by Congressman Ken Calvert (CA-42), includes a rider identified as Section 437. If approved, the rider on page 141 of a 142-page document will exempt the California WaterFix project from state and federal judicial review. Since the spending bill's introduction, another rider, authored by Congressman David Valadao (CA-21), was added that would also exempt the Central Valley Project and State Water Project from judicial review.

Upon its introduction, the bill drew sharp criticism from a variety of tunnel critics on the state and national levels.

Assemblymember Jim Frazier (D-Discovery Bay) expressed outrage at the proposed legislation and in a Faceook post called it an "attempted end run around states' rights." (emphasis added)

If the bill is passed in its current form, project opponents will be denied an important tool in their fight to prevent the construction of the tunnels.

In an email to The Press, Calvert said that the project has already undergone more than a decade of analysis and review. Further, he expressed concern that, given the volume of environmental documents, "environmental obstructionists" could keep the project tied up in the courts into the foreseeable future.

"Few infrastructure projects in the history of our nation have gone through as much scrutiny as the California WaterFix," said Calvert. "After more than a decade of studies and more than 50,000 pages of environmental documents, all of the project's stakeholders have had a plethora of opportunities to express their thoughts and concerns. The tough decisions about the California WaterFix have been made by Gov. Brown, democrat and republican legislators, and a host of water officials, and now we must move forward with the project. It's long past time to give Californians the reliable water system they deserve."

Meanwhile, Calvert fired back at critics in a letter to the editor of the Los Angeles Times.

"...the language in my bill is indeed intended to blow up the roadblocks built by radical environmentalists who desperately want to kill a project that will provide a clean, reliable water supply for 25 million Californians," wrote Calvert in his letter.

### This is really happening: Measure to split California into three states qualifies for

#### November ballot

For the first time since before the Civil War, voters across California will decide in November on a proposal to split up the Golden State — potentially remaking it into three new states.

An initiative dividing California, pushed by Silicon Valley venture capital investor Tim Draper, received enough signatures to qualify it for the November ballot, the Secretary of State's office <u>confirmed</u> Tuesday afternoon.

While the effort has cleared a major hurdle by getting on the ballot, it will be a tough sell to voters and <u>would require Congressional approval.</u>

The proposal would split America's most populous state into three: California would be reduced to a coastal strip running south from Monterey to just past Los Angeles. The Bay Area would be part of a new Northern California state with a border that starts north of Monterey, runs east and north to the Nevada state line, and includes everything north to the Oregon border. A new Southern California state would run south from the Northern California border, skirt around the coast from Monterey past Los Angeles, and include San Diego, Death Valley and the rest of the state east to Nevada and Arizona.

The effort faces strong headwinds. A <u>poll conducted in April</u> found that only 17 percent of registered California voters favored the proposal, while 72 percent opposed it.

Even if approved by state voters, splitting up the state still would require approval from Congress — no easy thing in a sharply divided country. Voters approved breaking California into two states in 1859, but Congress never acted on that request.

Creating two new states would add four new U.S. Senators, two for each of the additional Californias, while reshuffling electoral college math in presidential elections. <u>Initial analyses suggest</u> that Northern California and California would remain reliably Democratic, while Southern California would be a swing state.

### Newborns in China can expect more healthy years of life than Americans

The Chinese economy has a ways to go before its size matches that of the U.S. But in other key metrics, the Chinese have already pulled ahead.

China's "healthy life expectancy"—a measure of how many years a person can expect to live independently—has surpassed that of the U.S. for the first time, according to the World Health

Organization. Healthy life expectancy in China was 68.7, compared with 68.5 for U.S. babies.

The WHO figures relate to 2016, the latest year for which data is available.


"A baby in the U.S. is still expected to live longer than a Chinese baby, but we have health problems in the U.S. ... that in China they don't have," Willis Sparks, Signal writer for GZero Media, told CBSN. "I think this should be a wake-up call for people in the U.S."

Americans' life expectancy has been <u>dropping</u> in the past several years, driven in large part by rising income inequality. In particular, early deaths among working-class men, as well as stagnating lifespans for lower earners, have pushed life expectancy to about 78 years — down from a peak of 79.

Put differently, despite medical advances and improving quality of life for the economic elites, lower earners have basically not seen any improvements in longevity since the 1980s.

# Life expectancy at birth

China is projected to overtake the U.S. in average overall life expectancy by 2027



Today, 40-year-old man in the top 1 percent of U.S. earners can expect to live to 87, while the same man among the lowest 1 percent of earners has an expected lifespan <u>15 years shorter</u>.

China is expected to surpass the U.S. in overall life expectancy within the next decade, according to <u>Reuters</u>.

While China also suffers from income inequality, some research indicates it's been <u>improving</u> in recent years, thanks to a strengthening social safety net.
